Replacement Educational Programs and Operations Levy

Ballot Title

The Board of Directors of Eatonville School District No. 404 adopted Resolution No. 706, concerning educational fund-
ing. If approved, Proposition No. 1 will authorize the District to levy the following excess taxes, replacing an expiring
levy, on all taxable property within the District, to support the District's educational programs and daily operations,
including teachers, staff, classroom materials, and textbooks not funded by the State:

Should Proposition No. 1 be approved?

Explanatory Statement

Passage of Proposition No. 1 would replace an expiring levy and allow the levy of \$5,745,000 in property taxes within
Eatonville School District for collection in 2021, the levy of \$5,750,000 for collection in 2022, the levy of \$6,350,000 for
collection in 2023, and the levy of \$7,300,000 for collection in 2024. In accordance with Resolution No. 706 approving
this proposition, these taxes would be deposited in the District's General Fund to pay part of the general expenses of
operating the District. General expenses of the District include employee costs (such as salaries), instructional materi-
als, special programs, activities and sports, technology systems operation, transportation costs, maintenance of facili-
ties and other noncapital expenses of operating the District schools. If authorized by the voters, and based on project-
ed assessed valuation information, estimated levy rates per \$1,000 of assessed value would be \$2.50 (2021 collection);
\$2.50 (2022 collection); \$2.50 (2023 collection); and \$2.50 (2024 collection). The exact levy rate shall be adjusted based
upon the actual assessed value of the property within the District at the time of the levy.

Exemptions from taxes may be available to certain homeowners. To determine if you qualify, contact your county
assessor.

Statement For

Eatonville School District has been at the heart of our
community for nearly 90 years. In the last few years
Eatonville schools have received distinguished awards
such as Washington State School of Distinction, National
Academic Achievement Award and Washington STEM
Lighthouse designation. In order to maintain the qual-
ity of education we have come to expect from Eatonville
Schools, we must pass the 2020 Educational Programs
and Operations Levy.

This Is Not A New Tax.

This replacement levy is at the same tax rate that tax-
payers approved in 2018. The renewal of the levy will
maintain the daily operations of our facilities and trans-
portation; purchase textbooks, technology and class-
room materials. It will provide additional staff for instruc-
tion, supervision, and safety. Your yes vote will provide
activities such as sports, music, drama, and after school
academic support. This levy funds 20% of our school
budget. Vote Yes!

Special Election - Proposition No. 2 General Obligation Bonds - \$4,000,000

Ballot Title

The Board of Directors of Eatonville School District No. 404 adopted Resolution No. 707, concerning a proposition for bonds. If approved, Proposition No. 2 will authorize the District to: replace the all-weather turf field and track, upgrade the seating, lighting, and speaker systems, and install any necessary appurtenances for safety at the multi-use facility at Eatonville High School; issue \$4,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within a maximum term of 10 years; and levy excess property taxes annually to repay the bonds, all as described in Resolution No. 707. Should Proposition No. 2 be approved?

Explanatory Statement

Passage of Proposition No. 2 will authorize Eatonville School District No. 404 to borrow \$4,000,000 by issuing general obligation bonds. In accordance with Resolution No. 707 approving this proposition, the bonds will provide funds to construct, equip, renovate and make certain capital improvements to the facilities of the District, including: athletic facilities improvements to the community athletic facility at Eatonville High School to include, replacing the all-weather turf and track, upgrades to seating, lighting and speaker systems and installation of any appurtenances including, but not limited to sidewalks, walkways, and railings, deemed necessary for safety of the students. The bonds would be repaid out of annual property tax levies over a period not to exceed 10 years. The annual levy rate is estimated to fluctuate between \$0.40 and \$0.15 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation, with an average rate of \$0.25.

Exemptions from taxes may be available to certain homeowners. To determine if you qualify, call your county assessor.

Statement For

The community of Eatonville has invested in beautiful facilities for its students. Currently, the athletic facilities at the high school are in need of renovation to both reduce the occurrence of injuries and allow our district to host events. As the district does not have funds sufficient to cover those costs, Eatonville School District is proposing a Capital bond.

The Capital Bond will pay for the replacement and renovation of the EHS track and football field. Items such as organic cork turf, safety upgrades to sidewalks, seating, lighting, and bringing the facility up to ADA standards, would be paid for by the capital bond. Or community will benefit from expanded field availability and revenue created by acting as a host facility. Or students deserve to compete on facilities that are up to league standards and above all are the safest possible.
